Everything starts with reading...

Being able to read is the most important skill children will learn during their early schooling and has far-reaching implications for lifelong confidence and well-being.

(Letters and Sounds Principles of Practise of High Quality Phonics)

What is phonics?

Phonics is the link between letters and the sounds they make.

Although there are 26 letters in our alphabet the English language has 44 phonemes (speech sounds).

A **phoneme** is the smallest unit of **sound** that make up a word.

What is Phonics?

A **grapheme** is the written representation of these phonemes.

Graphemes can be written using either:

- A single letter
- 2 letters digraph
- 3 letters trigraph

Read Write Inc (RWI)

Read Write Inc is a highly structured programme working through progressive phases. Assessment takes place every half term and this determines book band.

Children are taught:

- The full range of common letter/sound correspondences
- Learn to hear separate sounds within words (segment to write).
- Learn to blend sounds together (blend to read).
- Read tricky words

Blending to read

Children are taught to produce the sounds accurately so that the children can blend them together to read a word

'Shwa'- The technical term for the 'uh' sound we add at the end of a phoneme

Mmmm not muh
Ssssss not suh
Lllll not luh


Segmenting to write

Children are taught

- to break down the sounds they can hear in words and write the corresponding graphemes using Fred Fingers
- Write each letter forming it accurately Hold their pencil correctly
- Write lower case letters unless at the start of a name or sentence.

Red Words

There are many words that **cannot** be blended or segmented. These become a focus later in the year.





How you can help at home?

- Read, Read, Read!
- Encourage children to speak in full sentences.
- Play I spy, Scrabble
- Challenge the children to find objects that begin with a certain sound.
- Play online games together (Phonics Play, Alphablocks on Cbeebies
- Shopping Look for a certain letter in the shop, on packaging, labels, signs. Can you find the letter that makes this sound?
- Can you find me the m-i-l-k? b-r-ea-d? p-ea-s. Prepare! Not good for all food words!

How can you help at home?

- Use your home learning booklet (first pack given out Friday 20th September)
- Practise letter formation.
- Practise writing own first names and then surnames.
- Give writing a purpose write notes for lunchboxes, create messages on the fridge get them to write the shopping list e.t.c.
- Correct pencil grip -pinchy parrot

writing doesn't have to be with a pencil...




Key rings

(sent home Friday 20th September)

Keyrings

- Find the letter that *pasta*, *sausage*, *eggs* begins with? ppp-pasta to emphasise.

 Doesn't have to be a short word to get them tuned in to initial sounds.
- Can you find the letter that makes this sound?
- Make a word for them to blend to read (2 or 3 letters).
- Say a word for them to sound out and make -segment.
- Ask them to say the sounds as you point to them.



Library Books (sent home Friday 20th September)

- Designed to promote reading for pleasure/ used as a bed time story
- Children are not expected to read these- they are too challenging!
- Does not need to be logged in reading record
- Will be changed on a Friday



Reading Books

(sent home Friday 11th October)

- Children will bring home 1 reading book each week, these will be changed **every Friday**. We expect at least 3 reads per week and these will not be changed if this hasn't been reached. We will pop a note in your reading diary/on Tapestry to remind you
- Reading books have 90% decodable words so children can use their blending skills to read the books.
- Need to be in school everyday in a book bag
- Record in reading diary- if it is not logged, we can't change it
- These books are matched directly to the assessment level and are carefully chosen- all children learn at different rates
- By the end of the week, your child will probably be able to read their book by just looking at the words as a whole, this is called fluency and this is the aim!

Wordless Books

- Your child will be given this book until they know the first 10 sounds
- Routine & book care- find the best time to read, model how to handle carefully and take responsibility for their belongings
- Oracy skills- a great opportunity to develop speech and language and support literacy rich conversations
- Expand vocabulary and prepare children for phonological awareness and listening
- Story structure- read the pictures, find beginning, middle and end
- Comprehension- understanding and answering questions



Sound Blending Book

- Will be given when children are confident with the first 10 sounds- m,a,s,d,t,i,n,p,g,o
- Has the first page with the word, followed by the word and corresponding picture
- Children should blend the word as best they can and continually practice this, not rely on the picture



Ditty

- Short stories built up of simple sentences
- Will receive 3 Ditty's per week on laminated sheets



Red, Green & Beyond!

- Sentences which include diagraphs
- Children should be reading independently by this point and building fluency and comprehension
